

Demographic achievements in the Arab world



Levels of schooling attainment

- » Low schooling level among older adults
- » Substantial variation in schooling exists across Arab countries, these can range from as low as <1 per cent in Yemen to a high 50 per cent in Jordan
- » High gender gap in educational attainment

Economic challenges

- » Because of the absence or pervasively small old-age pensions in Arab countries, the majority of older men continue to work after the legal age of retirement and much beyond (in Lebanon and Jordan 10-14% continue to work beyond age 80, Yemen 21%,).
- » The vast majority of Arab women work in the informal sector and are obliged to be totally dependent, if available, upon the income and work-related benefits of the male breadwinner or upon charity

Social challenges


- » Owing to higher LE among women, a higher proportion of older women than men end up living alone (1% in Bahrain to 17% in Lebanon)
- » Disintegration of customary family support system
- » Family members increasingly are no longer able to care for their frail elder family members, and those with the most severe disabilities.

Health challenges

» High levels of chronic non-communicable disease morbidity and mortality with the double burden of infectious diseases in certain countries

» With higher levels of co-morbidity among women than men
